CALLED TO BE SAINTS

Our goals for this lesson:

- Who is called to be a saint?

2	Ask students: "In the video, who did we learn can be a saint?"	Possible answers: • Anyone • All of us • Me and you
3	Ask students: "How do you know if someone is a saint or not?" *Fr. Alexander Schmemann writes that a saint "means very simply a man taking his faith seriously all the time" pg 104, Great Lent: Journey to Pascha *"A saint (from Latin, sanctus) is one who is holy, that is, set apart for God's service. It is a person who has cooperated with God's grace to the extent that his or her holiness is beyond doubt." (Orthodox Wiki) *Holiness or sainthood is a gift (charisma) given by God to man, through the Holy Spirit. Man's effort to become a participant in the life of divine holiness is indispensable, but sanctification itself is the work of the Holy Trinity, especially through the sanctifying power of Jesus Christ, who was incarnate, suffered crucifixion, and rose from the dead, in order to lead us to the life of holiness, through the communion with the Holy Spirit. (GOARCH)	Possible answers: • A saint is a holy person • A saint is a person who has dedicated their entire life to God. Every choice they make is to grow closer to God • A saint is loving, peaceful, humble

4	Ask students: "Which saint tells us that we are all called to be saints? Where does he say this?"	Answer: • St. Paul in the Bible (We can read it in the Bible from the letters he wrote to people)
5	Ask students: "What does it mean that we are all called to be a saint?" *St. John Chrysostom explains that we are obeying a call to draw near to God. (Homily 1 on Corinthians) This is a free choice of ours - all are called, but few choose this path.	Possible answers: • Everything we do, we do for God - not ourselves • Live our life very seriously for God, all the time • God is the priority in our life, nothing else
6	Screen share: Icon of the Ladder of Divine Ascent	https://skete.com/product/ ladder-of-divine-ascent-f88/
7	Explain to students: We spend our entire life trying to grow closer to God. It's a never-ending, hard work for each person. We will always have things that tempt us to turn away from God, whether that's going to a sporting event instead of going to church or watching to instead of saying prayers before we go to bed. This icon shows us that we can fall away from God at any point in our life - at the very beginning when we try to place God as the priority in our life or after 50 years. If we fall away from God, it's always important to get back up and try again. Do it again and again and again. Never stop trying.	
8	In closing: This summer, we are going to learn about people who dedicated their life to God. How did they do it? How can I live my life for God? These are questions I want you to think about during each of our lessons.

2	Ask students: "Saint Herman traveled to Alaska from what country?"	Answer: • Russia

3 Ask students:

"Saint Herman was a monk who traveled to Alaska as a missionary. What do you think a missionary does?"

*An Orthodox missionary is a person or group of people who preach, teach, and baptize as well as minister to the poor, hungry, suffering, and orphaned. They also strive to strengthen the infrastructures of the local churches through development of local leaders.

Possible answers:

- Someone who teaches people about God and helps them
- Someone who travels a long way to teach others about God
- Someone who teaches people about God by how they act and help others.

4 Ask students:

"How did Saint Herman teach the people about God and take care of them?"

Possible answers:

- He protected them from the cruel Russian fur traders who were abusing the native Alaskans.
- He took care of them when an epidemic broke out in a nearby village.
- He taught them about God and lived his life always for the glory of God.
- He protected them from a tidal wave by placing an icon on the beach.
- He protected them from a forest fire by digging a ditch and telling them the fire would not pass that point.

5 Ask students:

How can we use his example in our life?

Possible answers:

- Bring a drink to my mom and dad when they are sick
- Read a book about God to my younger siblings or when little kids come over
- Get up the first time when my parents tell me it is time to get ready for church



We can offer to help carry groceries into the house We can say a pray when we pass a car accident
