### DIFFERENT PERSPECTIVES OF THE SAME EVENT ACTIVITY

The four gospels were written by four men who recorded the life, miracles, and teachings of Jesus. Each of them were writing for the benefit of a different group of people and with a different goal in mind. All of the gospels support one another and are true, but there are variations in the gospels because of the perspective taken by each of the evangelists and the beliefs of the people they were teaching.

For this activity, choose 4 volunteers who will leave the classroom and work on the first part of today's lesson in the hallway. Provide each of these 4 students with a clipboard, the perspective worksheet, and a pen/pencil. Ask them to write about participating in the Divine Liturgy this morning before class. After they have finished filling out the worksheet, they can come back into the class and their recorded account of the liturgy this morning can be share with the class. Do their accounts support one another? How? Are they different in some ways? How?

Explain to the class, this is true for the gospels as well - All four gospels support one another, but with different people in mind (audience) and with a different purpose (goal) in mind when each of the evangelists wrote their gospels.

#### GOSPEL OF MATTHEW

Matthew was one of Jesus' Twelve Disciples. He traveled with Jesus and saw first hand Jesus' miracles and listened to His teachings. Matthew traveled and taught everyone he saw that Jesus had come for their salvation. Matthew knew it was critical for people to continue learning about Jesus even after he own death, so he wrote down everything he was teaching. We know this today as the Gospel of Matthew.

Matthew specifically wrote his gospel for the Jews. We know this because he doesn't explain Jewish customs or Hebrew words. Additionally, Matthew puts forth great effort into letting us know that Jesus is the Messiah and He is the fulfillment of the prophecies in the Old Testament. The Jews were the only ones waiting for a Messiah.

The Gospel of Matthew was originally written in Aramaic. It was later translated into Greek by other people. There are not any surviving copies of Matthew's gospel in Aramaic, but we know it existed because ancient, trusted writers tells us about it.

We don't know exactly when Matthew wrote his gospel. He probably wrote it over the course of many years, but his gospel is believed to be written between AD 50 and AD 70. The Orthodox Study Bible tells us that Matthew probably wrote his gospel while in Antioch, which is located in the southern tip of modern-day Turkey.

Matthew meticulously organized his gospel. He wrote it with an introduction to who Jesus is, then 5 main sections - each with a story and then Jesus teaching, and finally a conclusion with the trial, crucifixion, and Resurrection of Jesus.

### ACTIVITY INSTRUCTIONS

Read the Gospel of Matthew handout with your students. Ask them to use a light colored marker to highlight the main points of the lesson.

Then, depending on the size of your class, either have them work as a group or separate them into small groups to complete the next activity:

Tape the categories of "Who, What, Where, When, Why, and How" to the white board. This is in relation to the handout they just read on the Gospel of Matthew. Pass out the answers to the categories and ask the students to tape the answer to the correct category. Make sure you mix up the answers before passing them out.

Finally, review the lesson as posted on the white board.

Matthew was writing for the Jews.

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Matthew wanted to teach the Jews that Jesus was the Messiah they had been waiting to save them.

# WHAT language did Matthew use when writing his gospel?

Matthew wrote his gospel in Aramaic. It was later translated into Greek.

Matthew probably wrote his gospel between A.D. 50 and A.D. 70.

# WHERE was Matthew's gospel written?

Matthew probably wrote his gospel in Antioch.

- then with 5 main sections (each with a story and then Jesus teaching)
