#### THE TEMPTATION OF CHRIST

Matthew 4:1-11 ~ While reading these verses, show the icon of the Temptation of Christ from St. Mark's Basilica in Venice, Italy.

Through His own life, Jesus leads us by example for how we should live our lives. As we read the story of the temptation of Christ by the devil, we learn many important lessons:

Jesus is led into the wilderness by the Holy Spirit. He is alone and the devil is both curious to see if this man is truly the Son of God (because he heard the voice of God at Jesus' baptism saying, "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased.") and also seizes the opportunity to test Jesus.

How did the devil tempt Jesus? First, he said, "If You are the Son of God, command that these stones become bread." We all need to eat, even Jesus - but one loaf of bread would be enough for Jesus' needs. The devil tells him to turn multiple stones into loaves of bread. He does this to see if Jesus will eat more bread than is necessary - indulging in gluttony. Jesus does not do as the devil asks and instead shows self control by way of His fasting.

As an example, a waiter approaches your table and asks everyone sitting with you, "Would you like some dessert tonight?" Then you hear someone at your table respond, "That's tempting, but no thank you."

We know that having dessert after a meal is not necessary. Our bodies do not *need* a sugary treat. In fact, if we eat too many treats, we can damage our bodies. This is an example of a person facing a choice - indulging in the desire to have a delicious dessert after dinner or restraining oneself from unnecessary foods. Sometimes these choices are easier than others, but there are times when they are incredibly hard and we struggle to find the strength to resist the temptation placed before us.

Our parents make sure we practice learning how to read and how to solve math problems. They do this so we will be prepared later when we need to read a book, review a contract for buying a car, as well as, calculate if we've been charged the correct correct amount on our electric bill or paid the right amount on our paycheck. We practice reading and math from a young age in order to get good at it and be prepared for when a situation arises and we need these skills.

The same is true with fasting. We are provided with opportunities to learn and practice how to fast in an age appropriate way - from the time we are learning our ABC's and counting numbers. We are learning to not give into everything we want and this is incredibly difficult!! Fasting is as necessary a life skill as learning to read or solve math problems.

Additionally, temptations can be subtle or obvious as we face them throughout our lives. We have to make choices all the time when we go to the store and choose what goes into our carts. Are we going to buy everything we want or only the stuff we need? Are we going to choose to stay home and relax or put forth effort to go to church? We need to practice not giving into the little things that tempt us in order to say no to the big things that will tempt us. (When you're first starting to exercise, you lift light weights before you lift the heavy weights. Fasting is strength training for dealing with temptations.) What's going to happen when you go to a party and friends are pressuring you to try drugs or alcohol with them? First of all, it's incredibly important to surround yourself with likeminded friends. Good friends will help support you in making the best choices. You don't want to purposely place yourself in tempting situations simply because you want to be accepted by the popular kids. Secondly, when you're faced with temptations (and you will!), you want to be strong enough not to give into anything that is damaging to you.

God allows us to experience temptations because they strengthen us. Every time we choose not to give into the small things we want in our lives, we get stronger and hopefully will be able to resist the big temptations in our lives. What are some small temptations we face in our daily lives? What are some big ones?

Next, the devil takes Jesus to a high point on top of the temple in Jerusalem. The devil challenges Jesus again - IF He is the Son of God - then He should throw Himself down to the ground from this high spot because the angels will catch Him. Jesus responds humbly back to the devil, "You shall not tempt the Lord your God." The miracles of Jesus were always for the benefit of others, never for Himself. Think about the miracles we've read in the Bible. Each of them are subtle - the water turns to wine without any performance, countless people are healed by a few words from Jesus and sometimes without any at all - as with the woman who simply touched Jesus' clothes and was instantly healed. If Jesus threw himself off of the pinnacle of the temple, it would be to show off and boast to others that He is so amazing that even angels would catch Him. But...God never casts anyone down, that is the devil's work. God always heals. He always lifts people up. We are called to do the same as Jesus - to use our gifts and talents in support of one another, without ever shining a boastful or prideful spotlight on ourselves. What are some ways we are faced with the temptation today to show off by shining a spotlight on ourselves?

Finally, the devil takes Jesus up on a very high mountain and tells Jesus that if He worships him, then the devil will give Jesus all the kingdoms of the world. This is a temptation all of us face - to turn away from God and seek high status in the world - through the best job, the best house, acquiring the most money, etc. Jesus reminds the devil that it is written, "You shall worship the Lord your God, and Him only you shall serve." In Matthew 6:24, Jesus says, "No one can serve two masters; for either he will hate the one and love the other, or else he will be loyal to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and mammon." What does this mean?

The devil leaves at this point and the angels come to minister to Jesus. St. Theophylact tells us that the angels will also serve us after our victory over temptations.

In these three events, Jesus shows us how to battle:


- Gluttony (love of food) with Fasting



#### FOUR FISHERMEN CALLED AS DISCIPLES

#### VOCABULARY BUILDING:

On the white board, write each of the following vocabulary words and ask your students what they think each of the words means. This will help them gain confidence in decoding these words correctly when reading them in the Bible.



#### TIMELINE:

Each student will keep track of the sequence of events and the people we read about in the Gospel of Matthew this year using a timeline. Above the line for each event on the timeline, each student can either sketch the event or person with colored pencils or use clipart provided by the teacher. Under the visual depiction of the event, write a short description of what happened and who was present.

- Jesus' Genealogy (A list of Jesus' ancestors)
- Jesus is Born in Bethlehem (The Nativity of Christ)
- The Magi (Wise Men) Bring Jesus Gifts of Gold, Frankincense, and Myrrh
- Jospeh, Mary, and Jesus Go to Egypt
- Herod kills all the boys in Bethlehem and the surrounding area who are 2 and younger
- Joseph, Mary, and Jesus return to Israel and live in the region of Galilee, in the city of Nazareth
- John the Baptist baptizes Jesus in the Jordan River
- Satan tempts Jesus: 1) Asks Jesus to turn stones into bread 2) Tells Jesus to jump off of the top of the Jewish Temple 3) Brings Jesus to the top of a high mountain and offers Him all the kingdoms if Jesus will worship him and Jesus does none of these things.
- Jesus begins teaching the people in Galilee
- Jesus calls His first four disciples: (brothers and fishermen) Peter and Andrew and also (fishermen and brothers) James and John (the Evangelist who writes the Gospel of John)



## TIMELINE EVENTS

Students are encouraged to draw their own events for the timeline. It does not need to be as detailed as an icon. The act of drawing their own visuals encourages the brain to store the information in long-term memory because they had to neurologically form the images themselves instead of simply cutting out an image.

Make sure to have the students label what is happening during each event and who was present.






